HORMONAL SHIFT | Awareness sees more women in their 40s seeking help for symptoms once dismissed as stress or ageing

Women spot signs, seek help before menopause

MUMBAI

Growing awareness about perimenopause is prompting more women in their 40s to seek advice for symptoms earlier dismissed as stress, ageing or work pressure. Doctors say consultations are rising as women recognise the impact on their lives.

Maharashtra's 580 menopause clinics examined 31,288 women between January 14 and February 11, 2026; 30,034 received treatment and 82 were referred for specialised care. The Indian Menopause Society's 2026 guidelines estimate India had around 46 million women aged 45-49 in 2024, up from 30 million in 2011.

Perimenopause is the hormonal transition leading to menopause and can begin years before periods stop. Symptoms include irregular periods, hot flashes, night sweats, sleep disturbances,

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Lion Gate toilet a footpath hurdle, says BJP corporator

MUMBAI

BJP corporator Makarand Narwarke has urged BMC Commissioner Ashwini Bhadke to shift the above-ground Lion Gate 'Aspirational Toilet' and two adjoining Solid Waste Management (SWM) chowkies underground, saying the structures obstruct pedestrian movement and run counter to the city's 'Pedestrian First' policy.

Narwarke said the BMC's earlier proposal to provide a 0.9-to 1.5-metre-wide footpath at the site was never implemented. Moving the structures underground, he said, would free up the Kala Ghoda footpath, improve pedestrian safety and reduce visual clutter in the heritage precinct.

He suggested retaining only a minimal, aesthetically designed above-ground structure. "As we have successfully



pedestrianised Kala Ghoda and are working towards similar changes at Regal Junction, an underground toilet with a wooden-slatted pavilion and arched, textured roof would suit the area. With an acre-sized pedestrian plaza coming up nearby, there is no room for visual eyesores," he said.

The demand comes amid scrutiny of Mumbai's 'Aspirational Toilet' project. During the July 2025 Assembly session, BJP Mumbai president and MLA

IRCTC action on catering lapses

IRCTC's Quick Response Team (QRT) has intensified surprise inspections on trains across the West Zone, detecting unauthorised catering staff, missing uniforms and invalid identity cards. The checks aim to ensure that only authorised personnel provide catering services to passengers.

During an inspection of train 22838, operated by M/s Rathore Caterers, at Vadodra station on August 16, two unauthorised vendors were found onboard without prescribed uniforms and valid ID cards. IRCTC initiated action against the service provider. In another check on train 12480, operated by M/s Harish Kumar Arora, at Surat station, two catering staff members were found working without the prescribed new uniforms and valid ID cards. The operator was directed to take immediate corrective action.

Mahim crash kills watchman; another injured

MUMBAI

A 65-year-old watchman was killed after a speeding scooter allegedly knocked him down in Mahim, while a retired government officer suffered a wrist fracture in a separate scooter accident in Chembur.

According to Mahim police, Manoj Hruday Giri, 65, a Champaran, Bihar, native, worked as a watchman at Ganesh Apartment on LJ Road. Around 5:15am on August 15, Giri was crossing LJ Road near Paradise Cinema when scooter MH 01 FF 0326, allegedly being ridden at high speed, hit him.

The police rushed Giri to Bhabha Hospital, Bandra, where he was declared dead around 8:30am. Rider Roshan Rajesh Joshi, 22, of Gida Nagar, Cuffie Parade, suffered minor injuries and was taken into custody. Following a complaint by Giri's younger brother Dhruv Giri, 26, the Mahim police registered a case.

In the Chembur incident, Rajendra Dhondu Sawant, 58, of Kamoth, a retired government officer, was hit by scooter MH 03 F 1202 near Dr Babasaheb Ambedkar Udyan on July 13.

Around 11:50pm, he was hit by the scooter. The rider took Sawant to Kolkar Hospital, Khar, where he was treated. Sawant approached the Chembur police, who registered a case on August 13.

Cab crushes one-year-old boy in Sakinaka

A one-year-old boy died after being run over by an aggregator cab in Sakinaka, Andheri East, on August 15. The police arrested driver Mohammad Rizwan, 29, a Ghatkopar West resident, and later released him after serving a notice.

The deceased, Abdul Samad, lived with his family at Dosti Plaza on 90 Feet Road, opposite China Town Hotel. Around 6pm on Saturday, Abdul and his five-year-old elder brother were walking in front of the building when a white cab entered through the gate.

The police said the elder brother moved away after spotting the vehicle, but Abdul could not. The cab, allegedly driven rashly, ran its front-left wheel over Abdul's chest, injuring him.

His uncle, Javed Patel, witnessed the incident and rushed him in the same cab to Paramount Hospital, Sakinaka. Doctors referred him to Axon Hospital, which advised shifting him to Seven Hills Hospital, Andheri East. Abdul was declared dead there around 7:30pm.

Deported in July, B'deshi woman back in Mumbai

Arrested after re-entering India via an illegal forest route, say police

MUMBAI

A 27-year-old Bangladeshi woman, who was allegedly deported from India last month, has been arrested by the Mumbai police after she was found staying in the city without valid travel documents. The police said she allegedly re-entered India through an unauthorised forest route after being deported to Bangladesh.

According to the FIR registered at the Gandevi police station, the police received information around 8.15am on August 15 that a suspected Bangladeshi woman was roaming on the footpath near Chowpatty, opposite Wilson College on NS Pathar Road.

A police team reached the spot and found a woman matching the informer's description. She allegedly gave evasive replies about her identity and address and was taken to the police station for questioning.

She identified herself as Nadira Sultana, 27, and initially gave an address in Koparkhairane, Navi Mumbai. The police asked her to produce documents proving Indian citizenship and issued her a notice in Hindi and Bengali. She allegedly failed to produce valid proof and later admitted she was a Bangladeshi national.

The police said Sultana disclosed that Gwardi police had deported her in July. After being taken to Bangladesh, she allegedly returned to India by crossing through a forest route.

She gave her parents' names as Shahid Fakir and Rina Begum and her Bangladeshi address as Kokariya village, Sultan Shahi post, Gopalganj police station, Gopalganj district. The police records showed a deportation order dated July 22, had been issued by the Foreigners Registration Officer and DCP, Special Branch-I, CID, Mumbai.

Driver hacked to death on h'way

A 35-year-old trailer driver was allegedly murdered with a sharp-edged weapon on the Mumbai-Nashik Highway in Bhiwandi early on Sunday. The police suspect the attack may have taken place during an attempted robbery or theft of the steel consignment he was carrying.

The victim, Pawan Kumar Mahto, 35, a Muzaffarpur, Bihar, resident, worked as a driver with a Kalamoli-based transport company. The police said he was transporting steel reinforcement bars from Jalna to Mumbai in



trailer MH-46-BU-2110.

Around 2:30am, after crossing the Rajnoli flyover, Mahto reportedly stopped by the roadside to eat when unidentified men approached him. Investigators suspect they attempted to rob him or steal the cargo. When he resisted, they allegedly attacked him with a sharp weapon, causing multiple injuries, and fled.

Bloodstains were found inside the trailer and on the road. Kongkan police rushed Mahto to a private hospital, where he died during treatment.

Transport company manager Prashant Bhole said the owner informed them about the attack. "We were alerted that the driver had been admitted to a hospital after being attacked. However, before we could reach the hospital, he had already died," he said.

Crime police inspector Santosh Burade of Kongkan police station told the FBI that a murder case had been registered.

Girl stalked, dragged into bushes; mother rushes in, foils assault bid

A college-going woman was allegedly stalked, dragged into roadside bushes and subjected to an attempted sexual assault in Mulund early on August 6, but her mother's prompt intervention foiled the attack. The Mulund police have arrested Anil Ramcharan Karotia, 31, in connection with the incident in the Vaishali Nagar Road area.

The police said the woman had left home for college when Karotia allegedly followed her, intercepted her near roadside bushes and dragged her into the secluded area. She raised an alarm and managed to call her mother.

As the spot was close to their residence, her mother rushed there, prompting the accused to flee. The woman sustained injuries during the struggle. Six police teams examined around 250 CCTV cameras and nearly 120 hours of footage, besides carrying out technical investigations and checking police records.

CCTV footage showed a suspicious motorcyclist in the area shortly before and after the incident. Though the visuals were unclear, police continued tracking his movements.

On August 14, investigators spotted a man matching the suspect's description behaving suspiciously in the same area. After he left on a motorcycle, the police traced his route through CCTV footage and, acting on confidential information, detained Karotia, a CP, Talao, Wagle Estate, Thane, resident who worked at an idli-dosa stall.

The police found he had allegedly visited the area repeatedly earlier and appealed to women who may have faced stalking, harassment to approach police, assuring legal action.

Teacher mobilises support to transform school for Adivasi students

For the last 30 years, Anand Sonkamble has been teaching at various Zilla Parishad schools with great gusto and passion. But his journey has not been just about teaching. While teaching is one part of his job, the greater challenge, he believes, is ensuring that children not only come to school but also have a safe environment in which to learn.

Currently posted at a primary school in Chargon village in Thane district, Sonkamble arrived there as a teacher in September. What he found left him shocked. The small school was in a dilapidated state.

"There was no way I would allow the students to study in it as it was in quite a bad state, the roof was leaking and was in a state that would collapse anytime," says Sonkamble, who went out of his way to rebuild and transform the school, which is attended by children from Adivasi communities. "I reached out to government officials, corporates, well-wishers, NGOs, and friends, seeking support to help the students gain access to basic school facilities and a better education," he adds.

With the help of these individuals and organisations, a new ground-plus-one building has now been constructed next to the dilapidated structure, where the students can study in a safer environment. But Sonkamble's efforts
